Dear Family and Friends of Saint Lucas:

A note from the President I read an interesting article in Facebook this week concerning a certain olive tree. It showed a picture of this olive tree, contained the following caption:

The olive tree of Vouves, on Crete. This tree, which has a trunk 15 feet in diameter, is at least 2000 years old, and likely 2900 years older, based on the graveyard found nearby. This tree likely lived through the writing of the Iliad, the golden age of Athens, the rise and fall of the Roman Empire, the birth of Christ (and his crucifixion and resurrection). It lived during the time of mastodons, the Aztecs – and then lived for 2000 years after that. It still produces olives.

What amazed me more than anything else, I think, was not the sheer age of the tree, or the fact that it had been around throughout all of that world history, from pre-Hellenistic Greece through the Golden Age of Athens. It was not that it had lived through the rise and fall of the Roman Empire, or the birth and life of Christ, His crucifixion and resurrection, and the birth of Christianity. It was not the thought of this tree living in the age of mastodons and the Aztec Empire. The most amazing part of the history of this tree, for me, is that it is still producing olives to this day, thus carrying out the purpose that God had given to it in its creation.

What does this have to do with you and me?

The fact is that God has had plans for us since before the creation of the world. We read in Ephesians 2:10: For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.

How are we carrying out the plans God has had for us? Are we like that faithful olive tree in Crete, still producing olives now going on 3000 years? Or do we need a boost to get those good works going?

We're in the "summer slump" in the church year and might just need that extra push to get us in the swing of things as God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus. And the great news is that God has already prepared the good works that he expects from us.

May God continue to bless your summer and watch over you as you carry out His purpose for you!

Mercy and Grace Lead to Generosity

Thanks be to God for His inexpressible gift" (2 Cor. 9:15)! This is St. Paul's exclamation upon hearing the Corinthian church's

response to the preaching of the Gospel of Jesus Christ and his request for support for the church in Jerusalem. The Christians in Corinth heard and received God's mercy in Christ, and they responded to St. Paul's call to support Christians in Jerusalem with a collection. The Corinthians' joy filled Jerusalem's need.

This is the reality of stewardship. Because of God's generosity in the giving of His Son to die on the cross for us, we are to be generous with all that we receive from Him. What do we receive? Everything. All that we are and all that we have is the Lord's. He is the creator and the giver. We are His creatures and those who receive what He gives.

It sounds easy. And it is. But then again it isn't. Stewardship is easy because it is God's work. Through what God gives, we give to others. Through what God gives, we support the work of the church for the life of the world. He gives; we receive. And like our generous Father in Heaven, we, as His children, use what He gives to us to love and serve others.

But stewardship is also difficult. That is because it goes against our natural inclination to think that what I have is mine to do what I want with. This is our sinful nature. It is our selfishness and our greed. How can we who have been given everything — life, food, clothing, house, home, forgiveness, divine sonship, an eternal inheritance — be so stingy with what we give to the church, the place where we hear about and receive all that God gives us and does for us? We are all guilty of this kind of thinking. And the only godly response is to repent and trust in the Gospel.

For if God has given you His own Son, will He not give you all things? Yes. He will. This is His sure and certain promise. God provides for His people. He provides everything we need for this body and life and for the life that is to come.

The church is a mercy place. It's a place where God's mercy in the death and resurrection of His Son, Jesus Christ, is given and received. For us who believe it means forgiveness, life and salvation in the face of sin, death and the power of the devil. Here in the church, we inhale God's mercy in Word and Sacrament, and exhale this same mercy in love and service to our neighbor. And that is an enduring, joyful thing to do.
